



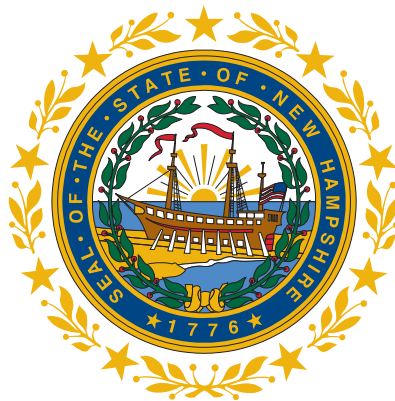

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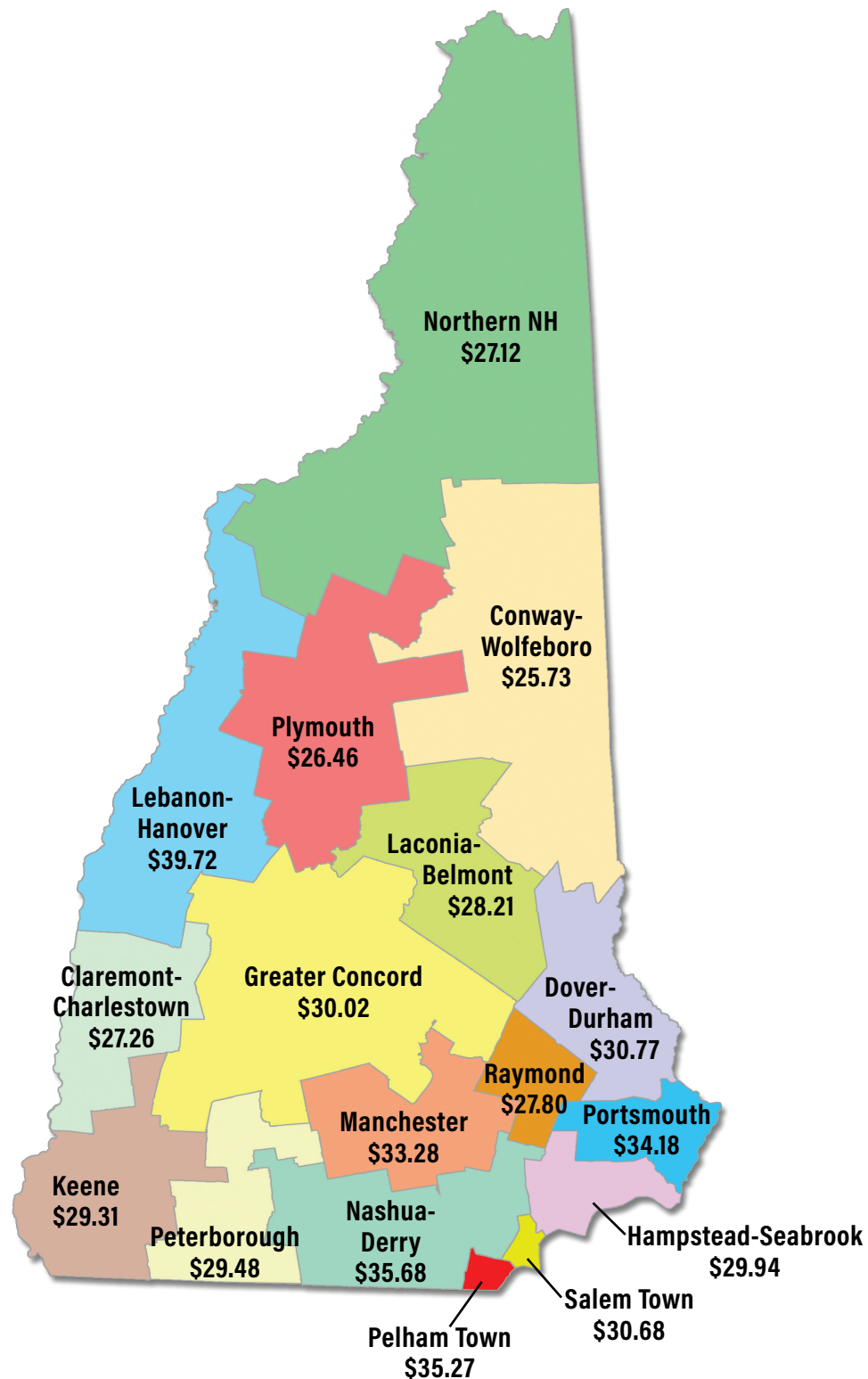

# Mean (Average) Wage by OEWS Wage Area

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These are the Mean Hourly Wages for OEWS wage areas in New Hampshire. May 2023 wages have been aged to June 2024 using Employment Cost Index factors.

# Overview

New Hampshire workers earned, on average, \$33.08 per hour in June 2024, according to the latest Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics estimates. Employment statewide is estimated to be 675,150, which reflects May 2023 data, the latest available for employment figures.

## Occupational Groups

The Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics survey classifies workers into more than 600 specific detailed occupations such as accountants, cashiers, software developers, and carpenters. These detailed occupations are grouped into 22 major occupational groups based on job similarity.

Of the occupational groups, Management occupations had the highest mean wage, \$70.20. The roughly 48,580 jobs in this group are made up of managers of various types and levels, including chief executives, who help to boost the mean wage.

The second highest mean wage occupational group, is Legal Occupations, with a mean wage of \$55.10. The estimated employment is not publishable.

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Food Preparation and Serving Related occupations had the lowest mean wage, \$18.00. They were the third largest group, claiming 8.4 percent of total employment or 56,380 employees. This occupational group includes jobs that are traditionally tipped, such as waiters, waitresses, and bartenders. Employers are asked to include these tips in the wages that they report.

Office and Administrative Support occupations once again made up the highest share of New Hampshire jobs, 13.4 percent. These 90,400 jobs paid, on average, \$24.60 per hour. This was roughly \$8.50 below the statewide average for all occupations. Jobs in this occupational group include bookkeeping and accounting clerks, customer service representatives, shipping, receiving and inventory clerks, and secretaries.

Sales and Related occupations, with 70,920 jobs, claimed 10.5 percent of the total jobs in the state, and had the second highest employment. This group includes jobs such as retail salespersons, cashiers, and sales representatives. On average, employees in these jobs made \$27.52 per hour in 2023.

## Background

The Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics (OEWS) program is based on a semiannual survey conducted by state employment security agencies in all 50 states. The New Hampshire survey is conducted by New Hampshire Employment Security's Economic and Labor Market Information Bureau (ELMIB), in cooperation with the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The survey collects data on occupational employment and wage rates of workers in all nonfarm industries.

Employers, job seekers, workforce developers, government planners, and economic developers are some examples of users of occupational employment and wage information. The OEWS program survey data is also used for prevailing wage determinations for Foreign Labor Certification, and are the foundation of occupational projections in New Hampshire.

This publication provides employment and wage estimates by occupation. In addition to statewide numbers, it publishes estimates for seventeen substate areas, which are based on New Hampshire's labor market areas. In New England, labor market areas are groups of adjacent cities and towns that are determined to have a high degree of social and economic integration, based on Census 2010 commuting data.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) publishes OEWS estimates for the nation as a whole, each state, metropolitan, and nonmetropolitan areas. The only strictly New Hampshire data that BLS publishes is for the entire state and for the Manchester Metropolitan New England City or Town Area (NECTA). Except for Manchester, the other BLS metropolitan areas include parts of Massachusetts or Maine. To better reflect the wages paid in New Hampshire, New Hampshire Employment Security publishes only wage areas from the New Hampshire portions of the labor market areas.

Some labor market areas such as the Manchester Metro NECTA and the Peterborough and Plymouth Small Labor Market Areas (LMAs) are wage areas in their own right. In most cases, however, we have combined labor market areas in order to make it possible to publish information on more occupations (Estimates must meet certain reliability criteria to be deemed publishable). For instance, combining the New Hampshire portions of the three northernmost labor market areas creates a "Northern New Hampshire" wage area. This way, many more occupations can be published than would be possible for each area individually.

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For more detailed information on New Hampshire OEWS wage areas and the labor market areas on which they are based, please see the Glossary at the end of this publication.

The OEWS survey is accomplished with the cooperation of New Hampshire employers who provide occupational data. Every six months, these requests for information are mailed or emailed to roughly 1,600 employers or employing units. The OEWS survey sample is stratified by area, industry, and size class. Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) codes are used in the surveys to define occupations uniformly and to organize occupational data logically.

The OEWS survey is designed to produce estimates by combining six panels of data collected over a 3-year period. Wage estimates for the survey are straight-time, gross pay, exclusive of premium pay. Base rate; cost-of-living allowance; guaranteed pay; hazardous-duty pay; incentive pay, including commissions and production bonuses; and tips are included. Excluded are overtime pay, severance pay, shift differentials, nonproduction bonuses, employer cost for supplementary benefits, and tuition reimbursements.

In the most recent panel, mailings of surveys began in May 2023, with data collection continuing through December 2023. This OEWS Survey recorded employment and wage data for employees performing 600+ diversified occupations.

For this publication, May 2023 occupational wages were updated to June 2024, using Employment Cost Index (ECI) factors. These wage data are not official Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) data series and have not been validated by BLS. The Employment Cost Index is a quarterly measure of changes in labor costs. 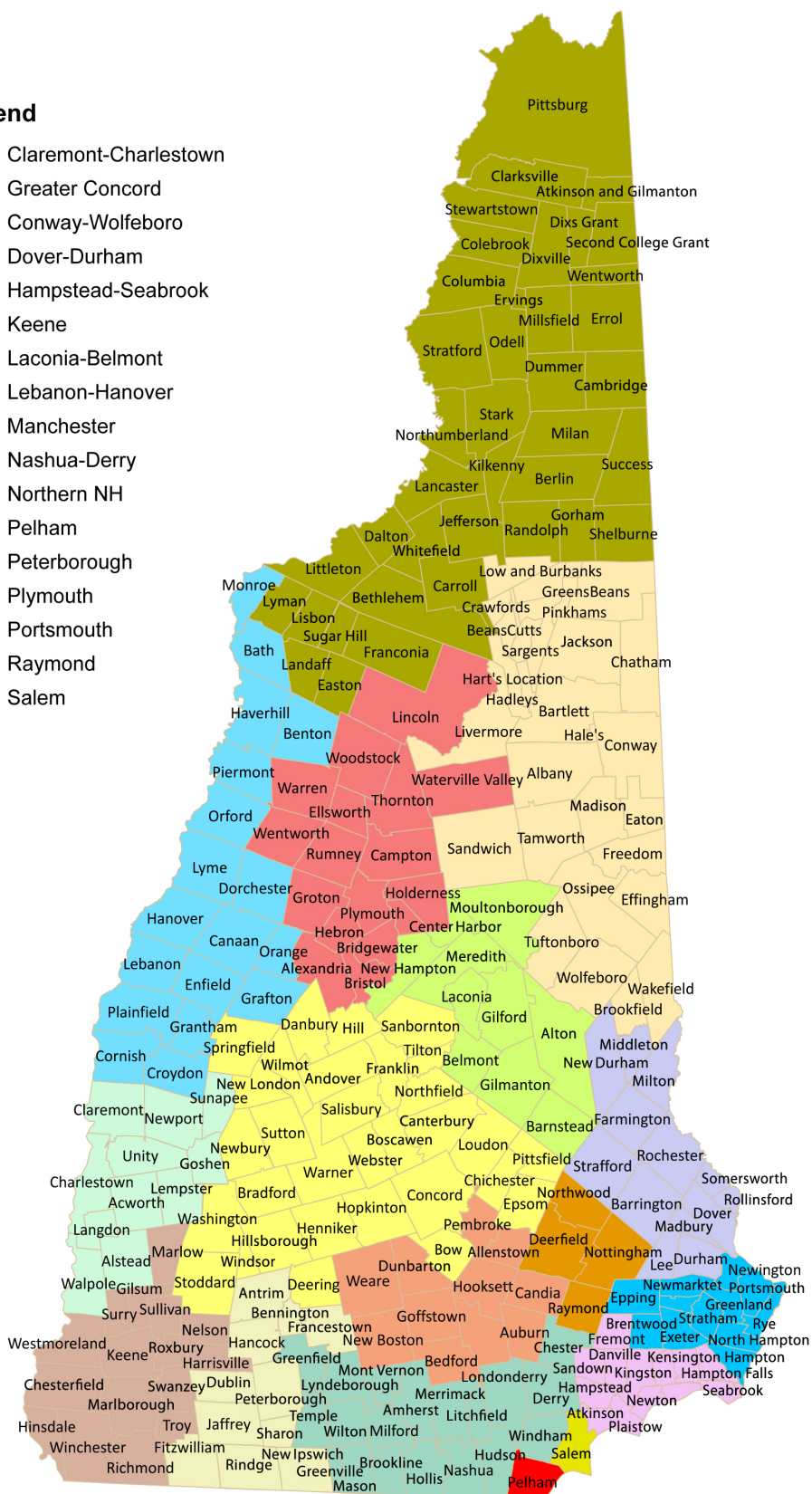

# How To Read the Tables

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For each occupation in the tables of this publication, there is a corresponding SOC code and an estimate of employment within that occupation. The remaining data fields are Entry Level Wage, Mean (Average) Wage, Median Wage, and Experienced Wage.

- 1 SOC (Standard Occupational Classification) Code is a six-digit code designed to define occupations uniformly and to organize occupational data logically.
- 2 Estimated Employment is an approximation of the number of people employed in each area, occupational group, or specific occupation. Estimates for detailed occupations may not sum to the totals because the totals may include occupations not shown. Estimates do not include self-employed workers. If the estimated employment is not publishable, an NP will appear.
- 3 Percent Relative Error – Employment: Percent relative standard error (PRSE) for the employment estimate. PRSE is a measure of sampling error, expressed as a percentage of the corresponding estimate. Estimates with lower PRSEs are typically more precise in the presence of sampling error.
- 4 Entry Level Wage is the mean of the lower third of the population.
- 5 Mean (Average) Wage is the average hourly wage. If an hourly wage is not available (for occupations that typically have a nonstandard work week) the annual salary is displayed.
- 6 Percent Relative Error - Mean: Percent relative standard error (PRSE) for the mean wage estimate. PRSE is a measure of sampling error, expressed as a percentage of the corresponding estimate. Estimates with lower PRSEs are typically more precise in the presence of sampling error.
- 7 Median Wage is the 50th percentile of the distribution of wages. For each median wage, 50 percent of the workers in an occupation earn wages below, and 50 percent earn wages above median wage.
- 8 Experienced Wage is the mean of the upper two-thirds of the population.

Because of confidentiality or lack of data, not all occupations appear in all areas.

NP Indicates an estimated employment that is not publishable.

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# Glossary

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**Occupational Employment & Wage Statistics (OEWS)** – A federal/state program that surveys establishments to produce data on current occupational employment and wages for all wage and salary workers. Employers participating in an OEWS survey provide the number of employees within their company, by occupation, broken out into twelve wage categories. Establishments or units of multiple establishments are usually included in the survey, at most, once every three years.

**Occupational Employment Estimates** – Estimates of the number of employees in particular occupations. Every OEWS survey respondent is classified by North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS) code and by size of establishment. Each firm's response is weighted and then scaled to represent all those firms in the state who fall into the same size and industry category. All industries are then combined to get an estimate of total employment in every OEWS category.

**Labor Market Area** – An area with a certain degree of social and economic integration as measured through commuting patterns. In New England these areas are typically made up of cities and towns.

**New England City and Town Area (NECTA)** – A geographic entity, created for statistical purposes, consisting of a city or town, or a group of cities and towns, associated with at least one core (urbanized area or urban cluster) of at least 10,000 population. These component cities and towns must be adjacent with one another and have a high degree of social and economic integration with the core as measured through commuting patterns. This is unique to the six New England states.

**Metropolitan New England City and Town Area (Metro NECTA)** – A Core Based Statistical Area associated with at least one urbanized area that has a population of at least 50,000. New Hampshire has four Metro NECTAs – one of which is entirely within New Hampshire's borders, and two contain portions of the neighboring state of Maine. The Boston-Cambridge-Quincy MA-NH Metro NECTA includes New Hampshire towns that are part of four NECTA divisions.

- ♦ **Manchester NH Metro NECTA** – an urbanized area entirely within New Hampshire
- ♦ **Portsmouth NH-ME Metro NECTA** – an area predominantly within New Hampshire, but includes the towns of Eliot, Kittery and York in Maine.
- ♦ **Dover-Durham, NH-ME Metro NECTA** – an area predominantly within New Hampshire, but includes the towns of Lebanon, Berwick and South Berwick in Maine.
- ♦ **Boston-Cambridge-Quincy MA-NH Metro NECTA** – an area predominately within Massachusetts which includes Boston and its suburbs. For most statistical purposes it is subdivided into its component NECTA Divisions, four of which include towns in New Hampshire.



# Glossary

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**New England City and Town Area (NECTA) Division** – a NECTA Division is a city or town or a group of cities and towns with a high degree of social and economic integration which contains an urbanized area that has a population of at least 50,000 and is part of a large (population of at least 2.5 million) Metropolitan NECTA. New Hampshire has four NECTA Divisions under this standard, all of which contain portions of the neighboring state of Massachusetts. All are part of the Boston-Cambridge-Quincy MA-NH Metro NECTA. The four areas are:

- ♦ **Haverhill-Newburyport-Amesbury, MA-NH** – an area predominantly within Massachusetts, but includes towns in the Hampstead-Seabrook area of New Hampshire
- ♦ **Lawrence-Methuen-Salem MA-NH** – an area predominantly within Massachusetts, consisting entirely of the cities of Lawrence and Methuen and the town of North Andover in Massachusetts, and the town of Salem, New Hampshire.
- ♦ **Lowell-Billerica-Chelmsford MA-NH** – an area predominately within Massachusetts, which includes the town of Pelham, New Hampshire
- ♦ **Nashua NH-MA** – an area predominately within New Hampshire, which includes the towns of Townsend and Pepperell in Massachusetts

**Micropolitan New England City and Town Area (Micro NECTA)** – a Core Based Statistical Area associated with at least one urban cluster that has a population of at least 10,000, but less than 50,000. The Micropolitan area is a new concept under the new standard. New Hampshire has five Micro NECTAs.

The Micro NECTAs are:

- ♦ **Berlin NH Micro NECTA**
- ♦ **Concord NH Micro NECTA**
- ♦ **Keene NH Micro NECTA**
- ♦ **Laconia NH Micro NECTA**
- ♦ **Lebanon NH-VT Micro NECTA**

# Glossary

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**Small Labor Market Area (LMA)** – a grouping of towns that are economically interdependent, but do not meet the population or commuting thresholds for a Micro or Metro NECTA. New Hampshire has 16 LMAs – some of which are entirely within the state’s borders, and others that contain portions of the neighboring states of either Maine or Vermont. These areas are:

- ♦ Belmont NH LMA
- ♦ Brattleboro VT-NH LMA
- ♦ Charleston NH LMA
- ♦ Claremont-Newport NH LMA
- ♦ Colebrook NH-VT LMA
- ♦ Conway NH-ME LMA

# Glossary

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**OEWS Wage Survey Areas** – New Hampshire has 17 substate OEWS wage areas. These wage areas are based on the New Hampshire portions of the labor market areas. Three of these are the New Hampshire portions of Metro NECTAs. Four are the New Hampshire portions of NECTA Divisions. Three are small Labor Market Areas (LMAs) and the remainder are built by combining Micro NECTAs and LMAs. The areas are combined to increase the number of occupations for which employment and wage estimates will meet standards of reliability and to exhaust the geography of the state. The wage areas are:

- ♦ **Claremont-Charlestown** – consists of the Claremont-Newport Micro NECTA and the Charlestown LMA
- ♦ **Greater Concord** – consists of the Concord Micro NECTA and the New London, Franklin and Hillsborough LMAs
- ♦ **Conway-Wolfeboro** – consists of the NH portion of the Conway NH-ME LMA and the Wolfeboro LMA
- ♦ **Dover-Durham** – consists of the NH portion of the Dover-Durham NH-ME Metro NECTA
- ♦ **Hampstead-Seabrook** – consists of the NH portion of the Haverhill MA-NH Metro NECTA
- ♦ **Keene** – consists of the Keene Micro NECTA
- ♦ **Laconia-Belmont** – consists of the Laconia Micro NECTA and the Belmont and Meredith LMAs
- ♦ **Lebanon-Hanover** – consists of the NH portion of the Lebanon NH-VT Micro NECTA and the Haverhill NH LMA
- ♦ **Manchester** – consists of the Manchester Metro NECTA
- ♦ **Nashua-Derry** – consists of the NH portion of the Nashua NH-MA Metro NECTA Division
- ♦ **Northern NH** – consists of the Berlin Micro NECTA, and consists of the NH portions of the Colebrook NH-VT, NH and the Littleton NH-VT LMA
- ♦ **Pelham** – consists of the Pelham, NH portion of the Lowell MA-NH Metro NECTA Division
- ♦ **Peterborough** – consists of the Peterborough LMA
- ♦ **Plymouth** – consists of the Plymouth LMA
- ♦ **Portsmouth** – consists of the NH portion of the Portsmouth NH-ME Metro NECTA
- ♦ **Raymond** – consists of the Raymond LMA
- ♦ **Salem** – consists of the Salem, NH portion of the Lawrence MA-NH Metro NECTA Division

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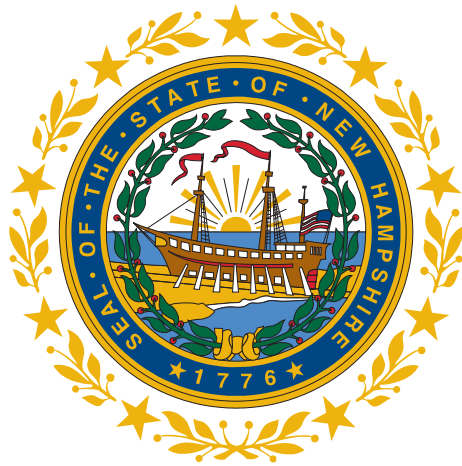
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
